#### STAMPEDE OF ELEPHANTS.

The fêtes at Munich in henour of the centenary of king Louis I. were marred on Tuesday (July 31) by a serious misfortune. There was a magnificent procession, in which nearly ten thousand persons took part, it started from the Carlsthur at about nine o'clock in the merning, and moved to the Odeonplatz, where aloos to the monument of King Louis, the Prince Regent and all the members of the royal family were assembled. Heralds, knights, and tumpeters headed the throng, which included the students' corps, the town guilds, the various associations of Munich, the subolars belonging to the artistic and scientific institutes, representatives of local and foreign art, unious and corporations, men in the costumes of the middle ages, pages, voterans, and children, deputations from twenty-six towns, and finally a detachment of the Munich Fire Brigade. Splendid weather favoured the spectacle, and a dense mass of people lined the pavements of the broad Ludwigstrasse, whilst at all the prominent points stands had been erected, which were filled to the highest tiers. Eight elephants and four dromedaries from Hagenbeck's Circus took part in the procession. Just as the procession had passed the Regent's tent the elephants suddenly came upon a steam car which represented a draspon snorting and spitting fire. The first two elephants pricked up their ears and trumpeted with fright, thus alarming the six who followed. With a plange they broke the chains that bound their legs. The men seated upon them were unable to control the terrified animals, who charged into the midst of the spectators, trampling down a number of those in terrified animals, who charged into the midst of the spectators, trampling down a number of those in their way. A panic ensued, and the people field in all directions. The elephant then charged a stand. Everybody attempted to escape at once, with the result that the stand gave way, and the occupants were precipitated among the dibris. After half an hour's career in the Residenaplata, the Ludwigstrasse, the Odeonplata, and the Brionnerstrasse the elephants arged into the n were finally captured in the arcades of the theatre with the assistance of cavalry, and were surrounded and tied with ropes. Four persons were killed and about twenty severely injured.

#### HOW THE TIGER JUMPS.

MAJOR C. N. COCK writes as follows to be Civil and Military Gazette from Shillong:—There has often been a paper warfare carried on regarding the question as to the power of a tiger to jump off the question as to the power of a tiger to jump off the ground with all fours to any height, and as any information bearing on this question may be interesting to your readers, let me give them my experience.

Last Saturday night Mr. Mann, the Conservator of Forests, very kindly rode over to my house and told me that a tiger had carried off one of the Government bulls at the Model Farm, that it was the finest bull, and there could be no doubt as to its below a time.

I at once wrote to one or two gentlemen near, and arranged to go after him the next day. As no elephants are procurable, I called for volunteers to beat, and about 150 Goorkhas and Seiks from the 42nd Regiment joyfully came forward to assist in the tumasha, armed with spears and kookeries. On Sunday morning at 10 a.m., a small party, consisting of Mr. Stevens, Mr. Inglis, and brother, and myself started for the ground and came forward to assist in the tumashs, armed with spears and kookeries. On Sunday morning at 10 a.m., a small party, consisting of Mr. Stevens, Mr. Inglis, my brother, and myself started for the ground, and after a four mile grind up-hill we reached the peak which (as you know, Mr. Editor) is the highest point in Shillong, and which has a small sacred grove about 2 acres in extent on its western slope. Here we found a gentleman of the Survey sitting disconsolate, gun in hand, who rose on our approach and teld us a tiger was in the grove, but that without besters it was ac use trying to get him. When I told him we had 150 men with us he gave a shout for joy, as he had no idea that the beaters were so near. Mr. Inglis and myself then went round the outskirts of the grove to examine the line of country, and make sure he had not aloped off down into the heavy forest below. When we had satisfied ourselves that there were no marks of his pugs leading out of the grove we took post as follows: on the extreme right my brother, next to him Jemadar Rungpoor Alleh of the 42nd N. I., then Mr. Walkam, of the Survey, then myself, then Mr. Stevens of the 42nd, and, lastly, a sepoy on the extreme left. Mr. Walkam and myself were posted in trees on either side of a ravine leading out of the grove, this ravine costained water and was a likely place for the tiger to go down, as it led to the heavy forest below. Afr. Inglis (a great tiger slayer) generously giving up all chance of a first shot had carefully posted himself lower down this nullab, so that if the tiger should escape us wounded or otherwise, he would stop him. The arrangement was most satisfactory, except that Mr. Stevens remained on foot, whifist we all secured trees of some sort or other. The beaters then extended on the far side of the grove and came slowly down, and out same stripes within a few yards of my brother, who fired and turned him, he at once rushed at the Jemadar, who fired steadily from his knee within a yard's distance, but failed to stop him, and he h

my left barrel and stood undecided for a second whether to go down the nullah or back to the grove; I then got a third shot at him as he slowly turned into some reeds at the edge of the grove, and went down towards Mr. Stevens (who had also fired three shots at him) as soon as the tiger came sear, the gun bearer skedaddied, leaving Stevens with only a single sanider carbine, but fortunately the tiger was too bad to come out in the open again. A council was now held, all beaters were ordered out of the grove, and the Jeanadar was brought up, and we anxiously examined his wounds; he had been seized by the upper part of his left thigh, and though he had four ugly flesh wounds no bone was broken and his femoral artery had escaped damage, so we bound him up and sent him off to cantonment in a rude improvised doolle. Two beaters now came forward, who declared the tiger had gone back through the grove and over the hill, but I was certain he was then a few yards from us in the little belt of reeds that fringed the grove at this part, the reeds were too thick and high to see into, so I and Mr. Walkam taking up the trail went up to the reeds, the blood had flowed plentifully, and we saw he must be severely wounded. Two Goorkhas with kookaries bending down in front of us, out down the reeds as we advanced covering them with our rides; we hadn't gone five yards when a deep roar close in front caused a general flightand showed us where our friend was; as it was useless going up to him in this covert.
